STRATFORD FESTIVAL

The Stratford Festival is transforming, for this summer, into an outdoor festival offering a season of six plays and five cabarets reflecting on the theme of Metamorphosis, with performances held under beautiful canopies that will hark back to the Festival's founding under a tent back in 1953.

The 2021 season includes two Shakespeare plays, *Romeo and Juliet* – called simply *R + J* for this production – and *A Midsummer Night's Dream*; two plays from the 2020 playbill, Edward Albee's *Three Tall Women* and Tomson Highway's *The Rez Sisters*; and two new plays, one about race and royalty, *Serving Elizabeth* by Marcia Johnson, and one, a musical, about the playwright to whom the Festival is dedicated, *I Am William*, with text by Rébecca Déraspe and music by Chloé Lacasse and Benoit Landry.

As large-scale musicals are not possible under COVID restrictions, the Festival will present a series of five cabarets with a blend of musical theatre and other repertoire. Created and presented by some of the country's most talented musical artists, these cabarets, presented in the Festival Theatre canopy, offer an opportunity to experience powerful performances in an incredibly intimate, but safe, space.

TRAVEL IN A COVID AND POST-COVID WORLD

We are getting so close to resuming our explorations in other areas of the world, but where to start?

This website provides frequently updated COVID-19 travel information for travellers. Their world map has 2 destinations with LOW RESTRICTIONS. You can visit these areas but will likely need proof of vaccination or a negative COVID-19 test. Ninety countries have moderate restrictions which will likely require proof of vaccination and quarantine upon return. Sixty-five countries currently are classified as having major restrictions, and travel is not advised to these countries. Ninety countries, including Canada, are labelled as Restrictions Unknown and advise travellers to check with the individual country for information regarding travel.



UPDATE FROM KENYA

Much has changed since Kate Fletcher left her home in Pittsburgh in 2005 to establish an orphanage for girls in Karen, Kenya, a suburb of Nairobi. Two years later, as previously reported, I volunteered for a month at Hekima Place, this family setting for girls who were orphaned due to AIDS/HIV. Others from the London area have followed, many of whom are retired teachers, like myself. Upon our positive reports, the Edith Benson Chapter of IODE became our partner, facilitating the sponsorship and processing of Canadian donations and providing tax receipts.

In the early years, younger girls lived with house-mothers on the property, while those of school age were bused to school. They were eager to learn, as girls from poor families didn't often have the chance to complete elementary school due to the cost of fees and uniforms. Since high schools accepted students based on their marks, the older girls attended several different boarding schools, while Hekima Place supported them with food, clothing and educational needs.

Hekima Place has continued to evolve; and as it thrived, vulnerable girls were often sent to it by Kenyan government agencies. In 2009-10, rather than rent property, a fund-raising campaign allowed the building of their own campus in the Ngong Hills of Kiserian, just south of Nairobi. They continue working to be self-sustaining by growing vegetables, having livestock and creating a bore hole to supply clean water for themselves and their neighbours.

Local schools were overcrowded, and corporal punishment was common; so the Board of Directors, using generous donations from the US and Canada, decided to build their own school for the girls and the surrounding community. This past January, Hekima Hills Learning Center opened and is already at full capacity of 133 students in Pre-K through 3rd grade. Next year, they will add 4th- and 5th- grade students from the waiting list of families in the area.

Presently, as in our schools, the girls have been learning online from time to time, according to their COVID numbers. The government had mandated that those who had relatives were to return to them. When the girls were learning remotely and living apart from Hekima Place, their families still received needed support. The girls have now returned, and school has reopened.

More than 15 years later, Hekima Place has cared for over 124 girls and is proud of its many high school and university graduates. Hekima Place is a truly remarkable place where all have a sense of belonging. By carrying on its mission to care for and educate girls, Hekima Place will continue to empower young women.
